On any given day, 870 million people worldwide do not have enough food to eat, and adherents to the Islamic faith work to combat world hunger. Feeding the hungry and helping the poor is an integral part of the Islamic faith. Every year, millions of Muslims around the world donate generously to feed others, especially around the time of Ramadan.

We're so proud of the Muslim-Canadian Community and the impact it has made globally this year. This Ramadan, food aid was provided to more than 5,300 households across Africa, Asia, and the Middle East totalling 26,550 people. Here at home, more than 5,400 people received food aid and iftar meals.

Each Ramadan, our goal is to widen our reach, and elevate our impact. We look forward to working with our supporters, donors, staff, and community leaders around the world in 2022.



Crisis:

COVID-19 infections continuously increased in Afghanistan, with 1,821 new infections reported on average each day. That's 97% of the peak — the highest daily average reported on June 22. Based on recent reports more than 90% of people are not tested at all. There have been 111,592 infections and 4,519 coronavirus-related deaths reported in the country since the pandemic began. Meanwhile hospitals are rationing their oxygen supplies. Oxygen prices have become extremely high because of high demand but limited supply.

HCI's Solution:

This project provides emergency relief in the form of 48 oxygen cylinders and PPE materials to 4 hospitals in Afghanistan, specifically the Afghan Japan Hospital, Al Hayat Hospital Laghman regional hospital, and the Nangerhar regional hospital.

Near the end of Ramadan, India was fighting against a nation-wide outbreak of COVID affecting more than 32 million people. Indian citizens living in remote areas were at severe risk of death, unable to access critical healthcare services and medical supplies.

To address the crisis, HCI initiated a special project to provide at-home care to COVID19 patients living in the rural villages of South Gujarat. Some of the patients were moved to the COVID19 isolation centre at Kosadi Village for a period of 15 days for treatment. In the cases where the patients had serious respiratory issues, they were admitted into the nearest hospital, and their treatment cost was covered by HCI.

The project played a very crucial role in preventing deaths due to COVID by providing the best treatment to the patients, and moral support to their families. We want to especially thank the Council of Gujarati Canadians for helping to raise funds for this life-saving project.

OXYGEN GENERATION PLANT PROJECT

Crisis:

India has seen a massive increase in COVID-19 cases, with the emergence of new strains. As a result, medical supplies have run out, vaccines are scarce and medical oxygen is hard to come by. This is exacerbated by the fact that India spends just over 1% of its GDP on healthcare, yet a large percentage of the population is considered vulnerable. This population group is therefore adversely affected by challenges such as these.

HCI's Solution:

This project helped establish an oxygen generation plant to readily supply hospitals in rural South Gujurat, India, with medical oxygen. This supply is needed to reduce COVID-19 mortality rates associated with a lack of access to oxygen. One plant generates 21 Jumbo cylinders in a day (144 cube metres & 144,000 litres per day) and meets the oxygen needs of 21 critical patients for 24 hours daily.



Crisis:

To date in Syria it is estimated that over 200,000 civilians have died due to the conflict in the region since the civil war's start in 2011. An estimated 11.7 million people in need of humanitarian assistance, 6.2 million internally displaced persons (IDPs), and 6.8 million who fled the country as refugees. The humanitarian needs in Syria expand to all sectors: health, housing, food security, and many more. Human rights groups estimate that there are nearly 2 million civilians in northern Syria, including internally displaced people (IDP), living in informal settlements.

Access to healthcare services is limited. There is a great need for innovative health care solutions that will meet the needs of these vulnerable people.

HCI's Solution:

The Mobile Health Clinics project aims to improve the wellbeing of the crisis-affected population in the Northern areas of Ragga, Syria. The mobile clinic provides medical consultations, raises awareness about public health issues, distributes medical supplies and hygiene kits, and collects data.

The clinic visits several villages: Sukkariya, Shiryan, and Hiwaji. The clinic staffs a general practitioner, a nurse, a midwife, and a psychosocial worker. Through these visits, the clinic served more than 1504 patients. Practitioners refer complex cases to nearby primary health care centers and hospitals.

The clinic also collects data to generate research on mobile health clinics as a means of health care delivery in conflict zones.

IMPACT: 15,933 BENEFICIARIES



Crisis:

For millions around the world, lack of access to clean water is limiting their quality of life. Due to water related challenges and illnesses, 443 millions school days are lost each year. Through diarrhea, typhoid, cholera, dysentery and other waterborne illnesses, 1000 children die each day by drinking dirty water. Unable to access clean drinking water means more people die every year which ultimately leads to an impoverished community.

HCI's Solution:

Access to clean water empowers communities to build economy and agriculture for trade and provisions, which reduces poverty, prevents early deaths and keeps the children in school. On the ground, in the most drought-stricken areas of the world, Human Concern International is providing vulnerable communities with access to clean drinking water. HCI works with local partners to implement WASH (Water, Sanitation, Hygiene) programs that are sustainable with the challenges of their communities. Together, we implement feasible and functional solutions. In addition, HCI invests in members of the community by training, staffing and equipping them with resources on the ground to manage and reinforce the WASH programs themselves. This sets up the infrastructure for long-term and sustainable change, uplifting the community for generations to come.

Crisis:

It has been almost three months since the ceasefire was announced between the Gaza Strip and the Israeli forces. The Israeli attacks during the month of Ramadan (May 2021) lasted for 11 days but caused huge destruction and killed at least 234 Gazans, including more than 100 women & children. A UN report released last July estimated that the reconstruction of the Gaza Strip will cost around \$485M. The 15 years of Israeli blockade on the Strip, left the Gazans with nothing but poverty and oppression and the last war added more challenges to their suffering. The Gazan women are the one's keeping the families united, raising the children, taking care of the wounded, sick and the elderly, heading their houses and developing day to day survival strategies. Due to the high rate of unemployment and the increased rate of poverty in the Strip, the women find it difficult to balance between their households' essential needs and their personal essential needs which are gender based.

HCI's Solution:

This project is in support of the women's well being and psychological support through the provision of Dignity Kits specifically designed to meet their urgent needs. The kit contains hygiene pads, underwear, soap, shampoo, hair brush, toothbrush, toothpaste, hand sanitizer, masks, towel, prayer dress and slippers. The kits will significantly bring comfort to the beneficiaries as they meet their gender based needs, these needs that are most of the time not met as the beneficiaries have low/no income and it needs to be spent to cover their families basic needs such as rent, food, & medication.



This year, more than 200,000 people received a share of Qurbani across 17 countries. Families received either a share of a cow, sheep, or goat. Your sacrifice allowed families in distress to enjoy a delicious meal and part-take in the joy and celebration of Eid ul Adha.

HCl also provided children with Eid clothing and toys to make their day extra special -- and it's all thanks to you. Children went out with HCl staff to shop for Eid clothing the night before the celebration. What else can we say other than that they were beyond ecstatic.

Everyone deserves to celebrate Eid and feel a sense of excitement and joy because #EidisForEveryone.

Crisis:

One third of India's 1.3 billion Muslims live in poverty. School age children, specifically young marginalized girls are disproportionately affected by poverty and face significant challenges attaining and finishing their education in order to allow them to thrive economically later in life. They also face discrimination for religious and cultural reasons which makes it challenging to be gainfully employed. These challenges persist here, and in many other countries around the world as well.

HCI's Solution:

HCI's Education projects provide scholarship's and resources to students who require assistance and access to education. Many of these children come from impoverished backgrounds where their families cannot afford to send them to school. Granting students from such backgrounds access to education allows new opportunities to arise, enabling them to participate in the economy and improve their lives through future job prospects.

ROHINGYA REFUGEE CAMP EDUCATION AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROJECT

Crisis:

Only 77% of refugee children are enrolled in primary school, and less than half of refugee students that start primary school will reach secondary school. Refugee children particularly face greater challenges in accessing education including availability of school facilities, accessible curriculums, and instruction in their language. Families living in refugee camps are made up largely of women and children. These women face great challenges in accessing decent work due to a lack of education and training opportunities.

HCI's Solution:

This project funded a women's vocational training centre and an elementary school that uplifts and empowers women and their children living in Cox's Bazar.

More than 24 women in the vocational training centre will receive 6 months of instruction in traditional sewing and receive a manual sewing machine to support themselves and their families.

Also, the elementary school will provide education for 30 students for an entire year in the subjects of mathematics, science, English, Burmese, geography and history.

Over 50% of students and 60% of staff are female.



REHABILITATION CENTRE FOR THE VISUALLY IMPAIRED

Crisis:

There are close to 2 million people living in Gaza, including its large refugee population (over 70% of the total), which has been continuously subjected to various forms of violence and restrictive actions, resulting in an alarming decline in social and economic opportunities of the population. Unemployment, deteriorating mental and physical health, declining standards of living, and restrictions on educational opportunities have all caused immense suffering for the entrapped civilian population of the Gaza Strip. Without access to essential services and opportunities for growth, children living with disabilities are one of the most vulnerable groups currently residing in Gaza.

HCI's Solution:

HCI and UNRWA have partnered up to implement an education project that benefits visually impaired students. Highly specialized braille typewriters and paper will be procured for students to learn how to write and read using these machines. Retrofitting and upgrading the current Rehabilitation Center for the Visually Impaired will ensure that students will be supported and have access to a safe environment to learn and grow, from kindergarten to the end of their schooling.

CHILD SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

The Child Sponsorship Program fills the vacuum left by a deceased parent, and provides children the opportunity to escape poverty and realize their dreams. Each child is provided with basic rights such as access to education, healthcare, food and water, clothing, and a place to call home. Through your support, children were protected from exploitation, child marriage, homelessness, and poverty. Your donations have restored security and illuminated the future of over 1,800 children across 11 countries.

In the last 10 nights of Ramadan, the global Muslim community was shaken by what transpired in Jerusalem, and Gaza. The IDF stormed the grounds of Al Aqsa and violated worshippers during the most beautiful nights of the year. Israel then bombarded the Gaza Strip with air raids and artillery shells, devastating the region. Hundreds were killed, thousands were injured - many of them were women and children.

HCI responded immediately. Food aid and medical supplies were sent over and distributed to families, shelters, and hospitals. The generosity and support that our community has shown was a beautiful display of solidarity with the Palestinian people.

Current estimates show that nearly 690 million people are hungry. This number has risen by nearly 60 million in five years. If trends continue, the number of people affected by hunger would surpass 840 million in 8 years.

With more than 690 million people at risk of starvation, swift action needs to be taken to provide food and humanitarian relief to the most at-risk regions. With your support, HCl has acted swiftly to tackle this crisis by launching the #ZeroHunger program globally. This program aims to provide immediate food aid to communities in crisis, and also build sustainable agriculture in select regions including Afghanistan, Sudan, Somalia, Yemen & Pakistan.

Crisis: More than 300 Syrian refugee families were forced to flee when their camp in northern Lebanon was set ablaze after a riot between members of the cam and some locals took place. The UN refugee agency (UNHCR) reported a large fire had broken out in a camp which housed about 75 families in the Miniyeh region.

HCI provided the families with immediate relief after they lost their tents and belongings to the fire. Families were also given heaters and fuel to help them survive the harsh conditions of winter in the camps.

IMPACT STAT: 3,000 BENEFICIARIES

Crisis: Different parts of Balochistan was hit by a 5.9 magnitude earthquake, killing at least 21 people, most of which were children, and more than 300 people were also injured. Around 800-1000 houses were destroyed or severely damaged, especially due to their construction being primarily with mud and stones. On October 15th, 2021, PDMA declared an emergency in district Harnai, as a natural calamity area due to the earthquake.

HCI's project provided lifesaving relief kits (food packs & winterized tents) to the families affected by the earthquake.

AFGHANISTAN HUMANITARIAN CRISIS - EMERGENCY RELIEF

Crisis: According to a World Bank report, more than 4 millions people have been displaced due to the ongoing conflict across Afghanistan. These people are going through extreme poverty, and for many life is near unbearable. A lack of food and nutrition, combined with rampant deadly disease has become the norm for many in the country. And a majority of the families are unable to find work which has made it extremely difficult to make ends meet.

HCI's programs in the region provided critical aid, especially nutritional food and medical supplies, to help combat the extreme rates of hunger and sickness, and provide some relief to desperate families.

IMPACT: 1,980 BENEFICIARIES

FLOODING IN GUYANA

Crisis: In May 2021, heavier than normal rains of more than 5 inches fell within a span of just 24 hours, flooding large parts of Guyana, cutting off highways and destroying properties. The Mahaicony River, a key source of irrigation water for farming and home use, overflowed and rose more than four inches, resulting in the damage of rice crops and loss of livestock. The flooding also contaminated the water systems, resulting in a dire need for potable water within the village.

HCl provided support through relief kits with non-perishable items to the community members in the Mahaicony village. This support helped members access basic necessities as they worked to rebuild their lives, following a reduction in the flood water levels.

IMMEDIATE EMERGENCY RELIEF FOR SOUTH KALIMANTAN FLOOD & WEST SULAWEAI EARTHQUAKE VICTIMS

Crisis:

The South Kalimantan administration declared a state of emergency due to flooding in multiple regions. A total of 1,500 houses in Pengaron Subdistrict, Banjar Regency, South Kalimantan (Kalsel) were affected. It is estimated that more than 20,000 people were forced to flee to refugee camps provided by the government. An earthquake also rocked West Sulawesi area leaving 637 injured victims.

HCI's Solution:

HCI dispatched immediate emergency relief to the victims of South Kalimantan Floods & West Sulawesi earthquake. HCI provided ready to eat meals, basic necessities for babies & women, blankets & mattresses and food baskets to those staying in the temporary shelters.

IMPACT: 5,000 INDIVIDUALS AIDED WITH THE RELIEF DISPATCHED.
