willed, He could have put you in
hardship. Indeed, Allah is Exalted in
Might and Wise."

Surah Al-Baqarah (2:264)

"O you who have believed, do not invalidate your charities with reminders [of it] or injury as does one who spends his wealth [only] to be seen by the people..."

Ibn Abbas, a companion of the Prophet Muhammad and a renowned exegete, stresses that this verse teaches the importance of sincerity in charity. He notes that charity should not be a means to boast or seek praise but should be given for the sake of Allah alone. The verse warns against actions that could diminish the value of charitable deeds.

2. Obligatory Almsgiving (Zakat)

Surah At-Tawbah (9:103)

"Take, [O, Muhammad], from their wealth a charity by which you purify them and cause them increase, and invoke [Allah's blessings] upon them. Indeed, your invocations are reassurance for them.

And Allah is Hearing, Knowing."

This verse outlines the concept of Zakat, a compulsory act of charity in Islam. Al-Qurtubi, a prominent Andalusian scholar, explains that Zakat serves two purposes: it purifies the giver's wealth and soul and helps the needy. He highlights that Zakat is not just a financial obligation but also a means to seek Allah's blessings.

Surah At-Taghabun (64:16)

"So fear Allah as much as you are able and listen and obey and spend [in the way of Allah]; it is better for your selves. And whoever is protected from the stinginess of his soul - it is those who will be the successful."

Ibn Al-Jawzi, a 12th-century scholar, interprets this verse as highlighting the protective nature of charity, that spending in Allah's way shields the believer from future hardships and is a sign of success in this life and the hereafter. Overcoming stinginess is a key to attaining spiritual and material success.

Surah Al-Hadid (57:18)

"Indeed, the men who practice charity and the women who practice charity and [they who] have loaned Allah a goodly loan - it will be multiplied for them, and they will have a noble reward."

This verse extends the concept of charity beyond material wealth. Imam Al-Ghazali interprets this as Allah inviting believers to lend to Him through charity, promising that He will repay them many times over. This verse encapsulates the idea that true wealth lies not in accumulation but in the generosity of spirit.
